- A growing love for learning: More students say they enjoy Math and Language Arts.
- A deepening sense of school spirit: Pride in HFCS has increased by 6.8%, showing students feel more connected to their school.

Parents/guardians recognize:

- Stronger literacy outcomes: An increase of 7.0% of parents feel the literacy skills their child is learning are valuable and relevant.

SUCCESSES

- Increased satisfaction with educational quality: An increase of 10.8% of parents believe the quality of education has improved over the past three years.
- Better access to technology: +8.9% of parents say their child has the tools they need to succeed.
- Focus on student well-being: nearly 9.0% more parents see the impact of wellness education in their child's daily life.

Staff recognize:

- Commitment to reconciliation: +18.8% of staff report engaging in actions that deepen their understanding of First Nations, Métis, and Inuit cultures for the benefit of all students.
- Responsive support systems: +14.2% see our school's supports and services as more aligned with student needs than ever before.

Holy Family Catholic School Education Assurance Plan 2025-2026

GOAL: Our goal is to increase Holy Family's participation in faith-based community service projects, with each class engaging in at least one project that reflects the teachings of Jesus.

GOAL: Strengthen positive relationships between and with all stakeholders, students, families, staff, and community partners, while increasing student engagement.

STRATEGIES

GSACRD Priority Area: FAITH -

- Infuse community service projects into the curriculum, aligning them with Catholic teachings and values, to deepen students' understanding of social justice issues and the call to serve others.
- Collaborate with Catholic charities, shelters, food banks, and other community organizations to identify service opportunities for students, allowing them to directly engage with those in need and witness the teachings of Jesus in action.
- Incorporate reflective sessions before and after service projects, allowing students to connect their experiences to Catholic teachings, discern the lessons learned, and deepen their spiritual understanding.
- Integrate prayer and liturgical celebrations into service projects, emphasizing the spiritual aspect of serving others and reinforcing the connection between faith and action.
 - Celebrate monthly students' participation in service projects.
- Organize service projects that involve collaboration between students and elderly members of the community, fostering intergenerational connections and providing opportunities for students to learn from their wisdom and experiences.
- Arrange field trips or service-oriented retreats where students can immerse themselves in communities in need to gain a deeper understanding of social justice issues and develop a heart for service inspired by Jesus' example (ie. Foodbank).
- Continue to focus on Catholic social teaching and social justice issues, empowering students to advocate for positive change in their communities and beyond.
 - Highlight a Catholic Social Teaching at the Good Shepherd Awards Assembly.
- Continue fostering the division's partnership with Catholic Social Services.
- Holy Family Catholic Church will present to the students catholic social teachings and service.

STRATEGIES

- Host two parent engagement sessions per year (e.g., literacy night, wellness night) and collect attendance data and feedback.
 - o Integrate student-led inquiry or project-based learning units in both Math and Language Arts in each grade; monitor through portfolios or showcase events.
- Increase parent/guardian survey response rates through targeted reminders and incentives.
- Plan and host at least 1 culturally or community-inclusive event.
- Establish and maintain student voice groups (Leadership).

GSACRD Priority Area: RELATIONSHIPS -

- Encourage parent participation in the School Council by creating a position of homeroom representatives.
- Include student, parent, and staff representatives in annual school planning discussions and measure engagement through feedback surveys.
- Ensure every class (K-6) participates in at least one community-connected learning activity or service project per year.
- Continue to utilize the Collaborative Response Model to:
 - Support all students in data-based conversations,
 - o Foster Team Meetings to plan curriculum-based projects, and
 - o Be responsive and action-focused to students needs and interests.
- Organize classes to have big buds and little buds to participate in learning and service activities.
- Continue to offer family engagement nights (e.g., Halloween Dance, Spring Carnival) in partnership with Friends of Holy Family.

SUCCESS MEASURES

School Measures

- Every month HFCS will complete a service project in the 2025-2026 school year, above and beyond the division initiatives.
- Homeroom classes will participate in an off-site opportunity to engage in community service projects.
- HFCS will partner with Chartwell and either visit the community or invite residents into the school.
- HFCS students will be able to tell others about the Catholic Corporal Works of Mercy and scriptures aligned with these teachings.
